Of course, some of our most treasured possessions spend most of their time in storage.

Photo albums, old letters, heirlooms and mementos are worth moving even if you don't look at them often



### Pack your bags

When you're planning what to bring with you on your move, don't forget about the bags you'll take on the plane.

Use these bags to pack the items you'll want as soon as you land, before we arrive with the rest of your possessions. Consider paying any reasonable fees to increase your luggage allowance.

Packing for a relocation is a little different from packing for a holiday. You'll want to make sure you have things you'll want to keep your day-to-day life moving as soon as you land. This is more than swapping sun cream for socks.



For example, use your carry-on bag to keep your important documentation with you.

You won't want to spend time searching through boxes if you need a vital document shortly after you arrive.

So pack documents such as your birth and marriage certificates, driving licences, medical and tax documents, and any other forms of ID.

Decide what's flying with you early in your planning process. When our packing team arrives, make sure those bags and items are all together and clearly marked as something our packers should ignore.



# What to do with the things you won't move

# Leaving something behind doesn't mean giving it up forever.

Depending on whether your move is permanent or temporary, you can ask friends or family to look after things for you; they can either get some use from your possessions until you return, or you can ensure they're well taken care of.

Selling possessions you don't need is an excellent way of helping to finance your move. Make the most of the various marketplaces, and make sure you list your items early in your planning process. If something sells quickly, you can live without it for a few weeks. But it'll be stressful to shift furniture the day before you move.

And if you don't want to leave possessions with your family but you don't want to sell them, you can put them into storage.



#### What to do with the things you won't move

### **Pets**

### **Paperwork**

Do you know what you need to complete your move? Customs forms and visas seem like obvious candidates.

But you'll also need your health and dental records; they make it much easier for a new doctor to understand and continue your healthcare without interruption.

You might also need tax records, and even a will. Not only do the specific requirements change all the time, but failing to fill in the right form can delay your move, or even stop it altogether!

### Letting people know

For example, notifying your local student loan company is a must if you have a student loan; they can't deduct your repayments automatically while you're abroad, so you'll need to set up your own repayments with them. You'll also need to inform your GP that you're deregistering from your local or national health service.
